

And a resolution relative to the donation granted to Calvert county for the use of colleges and academies, reported favorably thereon.

They were then severally read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of John Lamb of the city of Baltimore, was read the third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Dennis from the committee to which was referred the resolution in favor of Elizabeth Barrow, reported that the committee had had said resolution under consideration, and were of opinion it ought not to be assented to.

It was then read the second, and by special order the third time, dissented from and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Dennis then submitted the following message, which was read and adopted:

By the Senate,

March 9, 1832.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have rejected the resolution passed by your honorable body in favor of Elizabeth Barrow, widow of William Barrow, because we understand that the securities of said William object to granting the indulgence proposed to be given by the resolution. We will assent to a resolution on conditions said resolution meets with the assent of the securities, authorising the chancellor or Dorchester county court to appoint trustees for the sale of the land of said William Barrow's estate, to be sold under the chancellor's direction or the county court of Dorchester, and in manner as shall be deemed most advantageous for all concerned, and the proceeds of sale to be applied to the state's claim, and no execution shall issue or be proceeded on against the land, to be issued on account of the state's claim.

Mr. Mayer from the committee on finance, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to vest certain powers in the mayor and city council of Baltimore, reported favorably thereon.
