Mr Hughlett from the committee to which was referred a resolution in favor of Nancy Jones of Somerset county reported that the committee had said resolution under considation and were of opinion it aught not to be assented to.

It was then read the second, and by special order the third time, dissented from and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act, further supplemental to the act of December session eighteen hundred and twenty-seven, chapter one hundred and eleven, entitled, an act to regulate sales by public aution, was read the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Mayer from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for opening and extending Fayette street in the city of Baltlmore, reported favorably thereon.

The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Capt. Henry H. Johns; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on militia.

Also a bill entitled, an act relating to the free negroes and mulattoes of this state; which was read the first timic and referred to Messrs. Emory, Dennis, Wootton, Pigman and Page.

On motion of Mr. Chapman, the bill entitled, an additional supplement to the act of December session 1827, chapter 117, entitled, an act to regulate licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others; was read the third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Mayer, the bill entitled, an act relating to judgments and decrees obtained in the several courts of this state was recommitted to the committee on judicial proceedings.

The bill entitled, an act to divorce Joseph Harvey from his wife Rebecca C. Harvey, was read the third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Samuel Graham was taken up for consideration, and the amendment heretofore offered was read and adopted.
