

FOUR O'CLOCK, P. M.

TUESDAY, March 13, 1832.

The senate met. Present the same members as in the forenoon.

On motion of Mr. Wootton the preamble and resolutions relative to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company were read the third time by special order, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

His excellency the governor appeared in the senate chamber.

On motion of Mr. Chapman, the following order was read and adopted.

Ordered, That Messrs. Chapman and Emory be a committee to inform the house of delegates that his excellency the governor attends in the senate chamber ready to sign and seal the engrossed bills.

The engrossed bills from No. 191 to No. 209 inclusive, were read and sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of William Hughlett,

And a resolution in favor of Andrew Slicer and John Quynn, which were severally read the first time and referred to the committee on finance.

Mr. Mayer from the committee on judicial proceedings to which was referred a bill entitled, a further additional supplement to an act entitled, an act for the recovery of small debts, reported favorably thereon.

The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act to authorise the clerk of Queen Ann's county court to record a deed from William H. Cook and Ann Cook, his wife to Peter Cherrytree, was read the second time and the question was put "shall the bill be engrossed for a third reading?"

And it was determined in the negative.

So the bill was rejected.
