The provisions of this bill are highly important and much required under existing decisions of our courts of law; and as the interests of individuals are deeply concerned in the passage of the act, we trust that the bill may receive your favorable consideration. Our impression of the urgent necessity for the act constrains us to submit the bill (which is a short one,) to you again notwithstanding the protracted period of the session.
