Mr. Mayer from the committee to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, An act to regulate private banking, which was read the first time.

Mr. Chapman submitted the following message, which

was read and adopted:

By the Senate,

January 7th, 1833.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message proposing to go into the election of the Governor of this State to day at 12 o'clock, and concur therein. No other than the gentleman named by you, is put in nomination by the Senate, and we have appointed Messrs. Chapman and Page to join the committee named by you to count the ballots and report the result.

Mr. Page from the Committee to which was referred the resolution relative to forwarding to the Editors of papers and public journals in this state printed copies of the daily proceedings of the Scnate and House of Delegates reported favorably thereon. It was read the second, and by special order, the third time, assented to, and returned to the House of Delegates.

12 o'clock having arrived, the Senate proceeded to ballot for Governor. The ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein. It was then sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Chapman and Page, who had been appointed by the Senate to join the committee appointed by the House to count the ballots and report the result.

They retired, and after some time returned and reported, that on examination of the ballot box, they found there had been 86 votes given in all, of which James Thomas
