

On motion of Mr. Mayer, leave was granted to bring in a bill, to be entitled, An act to subject stocks and funded property to attachment and execution:

Ordered, That the committee on judicial proceedings prepare and report the same.

Mr. Sappington presented the memorial from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for reform in the constitution of this state; which was read and referred to Messrs. Sappington, Dennis and Mayer.

12 o'clock having arrived, the Senate proceeded to ballot for a Council to the Governor. The ballot box being prepared the ballots were deposited therein. It was sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Hughlett and Pigman who were appointed by the Senate to join the committee of the House of Delegates to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after some time, returned and reported that there were 88 votes given in all, of which Robert W. Bowie had 62 votes, Samuel Turner 79 votes, Thomas C. Worthington 68 votes, William Potter 62 votes, John S. Martin 64 votes, Nicholas Brewer Sen. 2 votes, and Littleton D. Teakle 2 votes, and that there were 4 blanks.

Whereupon it was declared that Samuel Turner, Robert W. Bowie, Thomas C. Worthington, William Potter, and John S. Martin are duly elected Council to the Governor, for and during the term prescribed by the constitution and form of government.

The Clerk of the House of Delegates, delivered the following Message:

By the House of Delegates,

January 8th, 1833.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We propose that a joint letter be written by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of this House, and forwarded by mail to each of the gentlemen elected members of the Executive Council, informing them of their election, and requesting their attendance at the seat of government, to qualify agreeably to the constitution and form of government of this state.
