

The senate adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, January 21st, 1833.

The senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Mr. Emory appeared in the Senate Chamber, and took his seat.

The message adopted by the senate on Saturday, referring to the consideration of the House of Delegates, the memorial of William Patterson, and others, relative to a geological survey of the state, &c. was sent to the House of Delegates.

The president laid before the senate, a report from the trustees of Washington Academy, in Somerset county, which was read and referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates.

The president also laid before the senate a letter from John S. Martin, esquire, communicating his acceptance of the appointment of member of the council.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Alexander Robertson.

Which was read the first time and referred to the committee on invalid deeds and defective proceedings.

Also a petition from sundry citizens of Dorchester, relative to the repeal of the act of assembly entitled, "An act to abolish imprisonment for debt, on certain judgments rendered by justices of the peace," passed December session, 1830, which was read and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

Mr. Pigman from the committee, to which was referred a bill entitled, an act to repeal an act entitled, an act for the preservation of Fish, in Allegany county, passed December session, 1831, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time, and passed.
