A bill entitled, an act to repeal an act to declare certain trespasses felony, and for other purposes passed at December session, 1826, chapter 260, so far as it relates to Washington county, which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

Mr. Hughlett from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, to which was referred the resolution in favor of Levin Willin of Somerset county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the House of Delegates.

On motion of Mr. Page, the committee to which was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Dorchester county, praying the incorporation of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, of the order of Independent Odd Fellows, was discharged from the further consideration of the said petition, and leave was granted to said petitioners to withdraw it.

Mr. Sappington presented the petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for a supplement to the act, entitled, an act to incorporate the Frederick and Woodsborough Turnpike Road Company, which was read and referred to the committee on internal improvement.

The bill entitled, an act to divorce Sarah Block of Dorchester county, from her husband Arthur M. Block, of the city of Baltimore, was read the third time, as heretofore amended, passed and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Wootton from the committee on internal improvement, to which was referred the petition of the Havre-de-Grace Turnpike Company, reported a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-de-Grace, which was read the first time.
