SATURDAY, February 9th, 1833.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The report of the President of the New Castle and Frenchtown Turnpike and Rail Road Company referred yesterday to the consideration of the House of Delegates, and the message adopted on yesterday relative to the adjournment of the legislature, were sent, and the bill entitled, an act to authorise the Trustees of Saint Patricks Church in the City of Baltimore, to hold certain property, the bill entitled, an act to authorise the commissioners of Washington County to build a stone bridge across Antietam Creek on the road leading from Funkstown to Williamsport where the old wooden bridge now stands, and the bill entitled, an act for the relief of William C. Weatherby of Baltimore County, severally passed by the Senate on yesterday, and the bill entitled an act for the incorporation of the Grand Lodge of the State of Maryland of the order of Independent Odd Fellows, passed by the senate on yesterday, with certain amendments were returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Sappington presented the memorial of sundry inhabitants of Harford County, counter to the memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore city and county to incorporate a company to turnpike a part of the Bell-Air Road.

Mr. Morris presented a memorial from sundry citizens of Baltimore County upon the same subject, which were severally read and referred to the committee on Internal improvement.

Mr. Sappington presented the memorial of Lewis Motter and others, praying for the passage of an act relating to the Westminster, Taney Town and Emmettsburgh turnpike road Company, which was read and referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates.

Mr. Morris from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled an act to divorce Eliza Selby of Baltimore city from he husband, James Selby, a mensa et thoro, reported favorably thereon. It was read the second time.

On motion of Mr. Emory, the bill entitled, an act to
