

Mr. Pigman submitted the following, as a substitute:

By the Senate,

February 14, 1833.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message proposing to elect one additional director for each shore, for the Farmer's Bank of Maryland, and concur therein. No person has been put in nomination by the Senate, in addition to the gentlemen named by you. We propose to go into the election, with your concurrence, at 12 o'clock on Monday next, and have appointed Messrs. _____, _____, _____, to join the gentlemen named by your honorable body, to count the ballots.

The said substitute was read, and on motion of Mr. Pigman, the message and the substitute were ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Page from the committee to which was referred the resolutions relative to the ordinance of nullification, and other proceedings lately had in South Carolina, reported favorably thereon.

They were read the second time, and on motion of Mr. Pigman, made the order of the day, for Tuesday next, the 19th inst.

Mr. Sappington from the committee to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, an act to regulate proceedings against corporations, which was read the first time.

The bill entitled, an act relating to private wharves, docks and the like, in the City of Baltimore, was read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

It was accordingly engrossed, and on motion of Mr. Morris, read the third time and passed.
