A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the Bank of Westminster in Frederick county; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Sappington, Pigman and Morris.

A bill entitled, an act for the relief of Frederick A. Stewart of the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on insolvency.

A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of John Hamilton, George Hamilton, Jane Rench, Thomas Rench, Sarah Boren and William C. Boren; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Pigman, Dennis and Mayer.

A bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to authorise the rebuilding of a bridge over Conewingo creek at or near Abijah Fenn's in Cecil county; passed at December session 1831, chapter 93; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Montgomery, Hughlett and Claude.

A bill entitled, an act for the relief of James Allcorn, of the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on insolvency.

A bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to provide for taking testimony in civil cases, passed at December session 1828, chapter 165; which was read the first time and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

A bill entitled, an act to repeal all that part of the constitution and form of government as relates to the division of Washington county into seven election districts, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Pigman, Sappington and Wootton.

A bill entitled, an act relating to the Stone Church House commonly called the Manor Church in Frederick county; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Sappington, Hughlett and Pigman.

A bill entitled, an act to divorce Mary Anne Kirby of the city of Baltimore, from her husband William Kirby; which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Mayer Hughlett and Montgomery.
