

MONDAY, February 25, 1833.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

John C. Groome Esquire, a senator elect for the Eastern Shore, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of George Reed Esq. appeared in the senate chamber, qualified by taking the several oaths prescribed by the Constitution and form of Government and took his seat.

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Chatsworth Water Company of Baltimore,

And the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the South Baltimore Company, severally passed by the Senate on Saturday, with certain amendments were returned,

And the message of his Excellency Governor Thomas, enclosing certain resolutions of the States of Delaware and Virginia was sent to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Mayer from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to divorce Mary E. Bond of the City of Baltimore, from her husband, William B. Bond, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the House of Delegates.

On motion of Mr. Mayer the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Central Savings Institution was read the third time by special order, and the question was put "shall the bill pass?"
