

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a Turnpike Road from such point as the Somerset and Cumberland Turnpike Company, of Pennsylvania, shall fix upon at the Pennsylvania line, to the Public Square in the town of Cumberland, or to intersect the United States Road, commonly called the National Road, as may be most convenient and practicable, was taken up for consideration, and whilst progressing in the third reading,

On motion of Mr. Pigman, the following amendment was read and assented to:

In the 13th line of the 3rd section strike out the word "demise."

The bill was then read through, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Montgomery from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for building a bridge over Deer Creek in Harford county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Sappington from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of the children and devisees of Henry Steiner, late of Frederick county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second time.

On motion of Mr. Sappington the bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act relating to people of color in this state, was read the third time, by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Mayer, the bill entitled, an act relating to the manner of holding and transmitting the title to certain church property therein mentioned, was read the third time, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Montgomery from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for building a bridge across the little falls of Gun-Powder, near Balden's mill, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought to pass with the following amendments.

Which were read the first time:
