Mr. Pigman from the committee, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Female Seminary of Boonsborough, in Washington county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time passed and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Mayer from the committee on judicial proceedings to which was referred the bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to compel the registers of wills in the several counties therein mentioned, to keep each his office at the seat of justice in the county, for which he shall be register, passed December session, 1804, chapter 39, so far as relates to Harford county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Morris from the committee on judicial proceedings to which was referred the bill entitled, an act empowering Peter Wood Crain to complete the collections of Jesse C. Cook, deceased, late sheriff and collector of Charles county, reported favorably thereon.
