

the same under consideration, and beg leave to report unfavorably thereon, for the following reasons: First, the treasurer states that one Samuel Frazier appears to have been on the pension roll of the state, as a private of the revolution, that he received his pension to the 7th February 1818, and that afterwards no application was made for payment; it is a fair presumption that the said Samuel must have died soon after the said 7th January, 1818.

“We further report that by resolution No. 26, passed December session 1823, the treasurer was directed to warn all persons by advertisement in the public newspaper, that unless pensions heretofore granted be demanded by them or those heirs within one year after the passage of said resolution, the same shall revert to the state; no evidence is offered to your committee, why said pension was not demanded, or of the time of said Samuel Frazer's death. We recommend the rejection of said resolution.”

The resolution was then read the second time.
