Whereas much of the time of every session of the General Assembly is occupied, and much of the expense of the legislature is incurred, in special legislation, and whereas it would conduce to the convenience of our citizens and to the ready attainment of ends of justice to have such general laws enacted as experience may suggest to obviate the necessity of special legislation; and whereas from a review of the special enactments for a series of years past it may be practicable to devise such general legislation as may supersede the occasion for a great part of the special laws that might otherwise be requisite.
