On motion of Mr. Pigman leave was granted to Messrs. Twelve o'clock having arrived, the Senate proceeded to ballot for a council to the governor. The ballot box was prepared, and the ballots deposited therein. It was sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Wootton and Page, who had been appointed by the Senate to join the committee of the House of Delegates, to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after a time returned and reported, that there had been 95 votes given in all. Of which, Robert W. Bowie, had 48 votes, George C.
