Mr. Chapman and Mr. Emory, who had been appointed to wait upon the governor elect, and request his attendance to qualify, appeared in the Senate chamber, and stated that they had performed that duty, and had been requested by the governor elect to say, he would attend in the Senate chamber, to-morrow, (Wednesday,) at twelve o'clock, to take the accustomed oaths, and to resume the duties of the high station to which he had been again chosen.
