

Whereas it is represented to the General Assembly that a serious riot has occurred among the laborers on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, in which several lives have been lost, and serious mischief is apprehended to the public works, unless the riot is promptly suppressed,—Therefore resolved,

*By the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Governor be and he is hereby requested to call out such portion of the militia of the state, as he may deem necessary for the immediate suppression of the same.

On motion of Mr. Sappington;

The said preamble and resolution were read the third time by special order, assented to, and sent to the House of Delegates.
