

“And the valuations first made and to be made at all subsequent periods of three years, after said lot and buildings shall be repaired, shall not be upon, or in reference to repairs and improvements made by said Samuel P. Smith and Reuben Worthington, but the growth and importance of the town of Cumberland as a place of business, if the said lot should improve as a place of business in consequence thereof may be weighed and considered by the court and jury in their proceedings, verdicts and judgments.”

The bill was then read the second and by special order the third time and passed.

Mr. Sappington from the committee to which the leave was granted reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for founding a college near Emmitsburgh in Frederick county, passed at December session 1829 chapter 167.

Which was read the first and by special order the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

It was accordingly engrossed, and

On motion of Mr. Sappington,

Read the third time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Chapman from the committee on finance, to which was referred the resolution in favor of Richard H. Miles, administrator of Clement Mattingly, former collector of St. Mary's county, reported that the committee had had said resolution under consideration, and were of opinion it ought not to be assented to.

It was read the second and by special order the third time dissented from, and returned to the house of Delegates.

Mr. Chapman from the committee on Finance to which was referred the resolution relative to the postage of the members of the Legislature reported favorably thereon.
