

It was read the second time,

Mr. Hughlett from the committee on revolutionary claims, to which was referred a resolution in favor of Elizabeth Amos, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message:

By the House of Delegates,

March 4th, 1834.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We return you the bill entitled, an act subjecting the fees of attorneys, solicitors, clerks, registers, sheriffs and other officers of this state, to the operation of the statute of limitation; and respectfully ask a re-consideration

The inconvenience to which the people of the state, are subjected, in consequence of fees of long standing, being presented to them for payment, which from the length of time which has elapsed, they have no recollection of, or perhaps they believe to have been paid, but having no evidence of payment, receipts either being mislaid or lost, are compelled to settle them anew.

We therefore hope your honorable body will pass the bill intended to remedy the evil complained of.
