In reply to your note just received, I beg leave to submit a statement made out by Mr. Ingle, secretary to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, showing the fiscal condition of the affairs of the Company.

The details shew, that the contracts entered into, and to be completed, from H. Ferry, to Williamsport and eight miles above, exceed the available funds of the
