Nathaniel F. Williams 72 votes, Thomas W. Veazy 78 votes. Scattering 4 votes, and there were 15 blanks.

Whereupon it was declared, that Thomas W. Veazy, George C. Washington, Nathaniel F. Williams, John S. Martin, and Gwynn Harris, are duly elected council to the Governor, for and during the period prescri-

bed by the constitution and form of government.

Mr. Page and Mr. Morris, who had been appointed by the Senate, in conjunction with the committee of the house of delegates, to wait on his excellency Governor Thomas and inform him of his re-election as governor, and invite his attendance in the senate chamber, to qualify agreeably to the provisions of the constitution and form of government, retired from the senate chamber, and after a time returned and reported that they had performed the duty assigned them, and had been charged by his excellency to express to the senate his acknowledgement of this renewed evidence of the confidence of the legislature, and to say he would be prepared to resume the duties of the high station to which he had been chosen, on Thursday next at 12 o'clock.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the fol-

lowing message.

By the House of Delegates, Jan. 6, 1835.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We propose with the concurrence of your honourable body that the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Delegates be instructed to write a joint letter to the Members of the Council elect, informing them of their election, and requesting their attendance at the Seat of Government, to qualify according to the constitution and form of government of this State.
