Mr. Pigman moved to amend said amendment by striking out the word "undertaking" in the 2nd line and inserting the words "whose president shall undertake."

The question was put, and it was determined in the

affirmative.

Mr. Page moved further to amend said amendment, by inserting the word "unanimous" after the word "the" in the 4th line—before the question was put,

On motion of Mr. Wootton,

The bill and amendments were postponed and made the order of the day for Thursday, the 4th of February next.

The senate adjourned until to morrow morning 10

o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 31st, 1835.
