

Mr. Hughlett submitted the following message, which was read and adopted:

By the Senate,

February 4th, 1835.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The state of our treasury requiring economy, in every department of the government, and believing that we ought to get through the business of the session by Monday the 23d inst, we propose, with the concurrence of your honorable body, to adjourn, sine die, on that day.

Mr. Morris, from the committee on finance, to which was referred the bill entitled, An act to allow further time to Matthias Dashiell, late sheriff and collector of Somerset county to complete his collections, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought to pass, with the following amendment,

Which was read and assented to.

Add, at the end of the bill, the following proviso:

“Provided, That no lands and tenements, which have been sold, shall, in any manner, or the tenant occupying the same; be answerable for taxes assessed previous to said sales or transfer.”

The bill was then read the second and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the House of Delegates.
