

The bill was then read through and the question was put, "shall the bill be engrossed for a third reading?"

The yeas and nays were asked for and on taking them they appeared as follows:

So it was determined in the Affirmative.

Mr. Mayer, from the committee on invalid deeds and defective proceedings, to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, An act to declare valid a deed from Peter Briley to James Briley,

Which was read the first, and by special order the second time; and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

The president laid before the Senate a communication from the treasurer of the Western Shore, made in obedience to Resolution, No. 77, of 1827,

Which was read and referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates.

The president also laid before the Senate a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Maryland College,

Which was read and referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning, 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, Feb. 14, 1835.
