

Which was read and assented to:

At the end of the bill add:

“Provided, that if any person or persons, against whom a claim shall be set up by said Thomas Perry, for fees, or officers fees as aforesaid, shall make affidavit before any justice of the peace of said county, that he or she believes the same to have been paid and satisfied, it shall forever bar the claim being collected by execution as aforesaid. And provided also, that nothing in this act, shall be construed to authorise the collection by execution, of any claim against the estate of any deceased person.”

The bill was then read the second, and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Groome presented the petition of William Russell, that the state would relinquish its right to certain real estate therein mentioned.

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Groome, Wilson and Wootton.
