Mr. Mayer, from the committee to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, an act relating to the city of Baltimore, passed at December session, 1817, chapter 148,

Which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled an act relating to justices of the peace in the city of Baltimore,

Was being read the second time, when,

On motion of Mr. Morris,

The following amendment was read and dissented from:

Strike out all of the first section, after the word "act," in the 2d line.

The bill was then read through, and the question put,

"Shall the bill be engrossed for a third reading?"

Mr. Morris, from the committee on finance, to which was referred the report and resolution relative to the State's Tobacco Warehouses, and resolutions to pay the expenses of the Engineer and Commissioners, incurred in making a survey between Cape Charles and Lewis Town, reported favorably thereon.

They were severally read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and returned to the House of Delegates.
