

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the opening and extension of East street, in the city of Annapolis, and to close up the street now leading from East to Prince George street.

The President announced the order of the day—being the bill, entitled, An act, to repeal an act, passed at December session 1832, chapter 318, and for other purposes.

The amendment proposed yesterday by Mr. Wootton, was read and assented to:

The bill was then read through and the question put, "Shall the bill be engrossed for a third reading?"

So it was determined in the negative, and the bill rejected.

Mr. Mayer, presented the petition of Charles R. Barney and others, praying an act to authorise an exchange with them on the part of James Howard McHenry, a minor of certain ground in Baltimore,

Which was read and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

Mr. Emory from the committee on colored population, to which was referred the bill, entitled an additional supplement to an act relating to free negroes and slaves, passed at December session 1831, chapter 323, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought to pass with the following amendment,

Which was read the first time, and

On motion of Mr. Pigman,

The bill and amendment were ordered to lie on the table.
