Mr. Mayer presented the memorial of Eliza Kite, for a divorce a vinculo matrimonii,

Which was read and referred to the committee on divorces.

On motion of Mr. Mayer,

Leave was granted to the committee on judicial proceedings, to prepare and report a bill to be entitled, a supplement to an act to authorise the appointment of justices of the peace in the city of Baltimore, with limited jurisdiction, passed at December session 1825, chapter 159.

Mr. Mayer from the committee to which was referred the resolution in relation to the State's Wharfinger in the city of Baltimore, reported favorably thereon,

It was read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and returned to the House of Delegates.

The President announced the order of the day, being the Report and Resolutions relative to the Southern and Western Boundaries of this state;

They were read the second time.

Mr. Groome from the committee to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, an act for the benefit of William Russell,

Which was read the first time.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, An act to divorce Virginia Williams, from her husband Isaac Williams,

Which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on Divorces.

On motion of Mr. Forrest,

It was ordered, that the Senate take a recess until five o'clock, P. M.
