

So it was determined the affirmative, and the bill returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message.

By the House of Delegates,
March 17th, 1835.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We propose with the concurrence of your honorable body, to invite his Excellency the Governor to attend in the Senate Chamber to-morrow at 4 o'clock, P. M. for the purpose of signing the bills which have passed both branches of the Legislature, at its present session; and for that purpose, have appointed Messrs. Cottman and Wharton, on the part of this house, to join such gentlemen as may be named by your honorable body, to perform that service.

A resolution relative to the tobacco inspection revenue, and

Which were severally read the first time, and referred to the committee on finance.

A resolution in favor of Hester Penefield

Which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on Revolutionary claims.

Also the following bills:

A bill entitled, an act to divorce Hamutal Wane, from her husband Thomas Wane,

And a bill entitled an act to divorce Rosanna Antenson, of Washington county, from her husband Eli Antenson,

Which were severally read the first time, and referred to the committee on divorcees.

A bill entitled, an act to authorise the clerk of Frederick county court, to record a deed of manumission from John Short to James Ross,

A bill entitled, an act to authorise John D. Perkins of Kent county, in the state of Delaware to make and execute a deed of manumission, and to have the same recorded in Queen Anne's county,

Which were severally read the first time and referred to the committee on coloured population,
