The appointed hour having arrived, the Senate proceeded to ballot for Governor. The ballot box was prepared and the ballots deposited therein. It was then sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Montgomery and Sappington, who had been appointed conjointly with a committee of the House of Delegates, to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after a time returned and reported, that they had found there were 76 votes given in all—of which Thomas W. Veazey, received 53 votes, and there were 23 blanks.

Whereupon it was declared, that the Hon. Thomas W. Veazey, is duly elected Governor of the State of Maryland, for and during the term prescribed by the constitution.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered the following messages:

The Honorable Thomas W. Veazey, of Cecil county, having been elected Governor, we propose that a joint letter be written by the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Delegates, and forwarded immediately by express, informing that gentleman of his election, and requesting his attendance at the seat of government to qualify according to the constitution of this state.
