1. Be it Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Lottery System is believed to be pregnant with evil, to the community, of great and growing magnitude, and that it should not be continued beyond the period necessary to finish and complete the drawings of existing grants.

2. Resolved, That we will not entertain any application for the grant of any new scheme of a Lottery for
