3. Resolved, That it has been found, by experience, to be useless and unavailing to attempt to prohibit the sale of foreign Lottery Tickets within the State, whilst there is a single State in the Union which protects, patronizes and encourages the system; and for the purpose of bringing about concert in action through all the States, be it further

4. Resolved, That our sister States be respectfully invited, and earnestly requested to institute forthwith, such legislative action as will have for its object the final and entire extirpation of the whole system.

5. Resolved, That His Excellency the Governor, be requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions, to the respective Governors of the several States, to be laid before the respective Legislatures thereof.

Mr. Mayer presented the memorial of the Patapsco Insurance Company, for a continuation of their charter, to enable them to wind up their business.

A bill entitled, an act authorising the Judges of the Levy Court of Frederick county, in their discretion, to levy a sum of money to build a bridge over Catocin creek, on the public road leading from Middletown by the late John Shafer's mill, now David Ramsburg's mill.
