

And returned the bill which originated in the Senate, entitled, an act for shutting up certain parts of Saint Paul's street, and of Lovegrove Alley, in the city of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass."

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

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SATURDAY, January 16th, 1836.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday, except Mr. Chapman, President.

The clerk informed the Senate that he had received a letter from the President of the Senate in which he stated that the situation of his family required his presence at home for a few days, and asked leave of absence.

On motion of Mr. Emory,

The Senate proceeded to the election of a President, pro tem.

On motion of Mr. Emory, Mr. Hughlett was put in nomination.

The ballot box was prepared and the ballots deposited therein, and on examination thereof it appeared there had been eight votes given, seven of which were for Mr. Hughlett, and there was one blank.

Whereupon it was declared that the Honorable William Hughlett is duly elected President, pro tem.

The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Morris from the committee on finance, which was yesterday instructed to enquire into the expediency of authorising the commissioner of loans to substitute certificates of stock in lieu of bonds, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to provide for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland, and for the completion of the Baltimore and Susquehanna Rail Road to the borough of York in the State of Pennsylvania.

Which was read the first time.

Mr. Mayer from the committee to which was referred the memorial of the Patapsco Insurance Company, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate the Patapsco Insurance Company,
