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TUESDAY, January 19, 1836.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday.

The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The message adopted yesterday by the Senate, proposing the appointment of a joint committee on the subject of providing fire proof offices for the records of the state, was sent to the house of delegates.

The President laid before the Senate a letter from John McKenney, Esquire, a member elect of the Council, communicating his acceptance of the appointment.

Which was read and referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates.

Mr. Morris presented the petition of Robert Howard, and others, praying that Currants Alley should not be opened, and that the act of the last session relative thereto be repealed.

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Morris, Mayer and Groome.

The Senate proceeded to the consideration of the order of the day: being the bill entitled, A further additional supplement to an act entitled, an act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections.

The bill was being read the second time, when

Strike out the preamble of the bill.

On motion of Mr. Wootton, the following amendment was read and assented to:

In the 3rd line of the 1st section, strike out the words "sheriffs of the counties"

The following amendment was read and assented to:

In the 1st line of the 2nd section strike out the word "any" where it last occurs.
