### THE NEW GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

By the last annual report, it was made known to the General Assembly, that the Visitors and Governors were desirous to give increased efficiency to the College, as a nursery for Teachers, to the state, and that they looked to an increased patronage, for the means to carry their design into effect. The committee have the satisfaction to believe that this object, also, is about to be attained. The erection of the new College Edifice, has been the means of procuring, the services of an additional Professor, who, in connexion with the professor heretofore engaged, will have the charge of the Grammar School. From what is known of the capacity and experience of both these Teachers, one of whom will take the English, and the other the Latin Branches of the School, the Visitors and Governors hope to render this department, a model for all institutions of academical instruction, throughout the state. The business of preparing Teachers, also, will properly begin, and be mainly conducted, in this department; and a course of instructions, suited to this specific object, will be given, by the English Professor, which shall embrace all the improvements in the most approved systems of education. In addition to this, the relation of the School, as a nursery to the classes of the College proper, is so important, that it has been resolved, as soon as the means can be obtained, to erect, for its accommodation, a separate School House, of the most modern and improved plan. Buildings of this description, are generally, so ill constructed, in regard to the health and comfort, as well as discipline and proficiency of the pupils, while so much attention in some parts of the union, has been, of late, directed to their improvement, that
