peals to her generosity and pride. They mean the act of incorporation of St. John's. The committee cannot forget that the act of 1832, was one only of partial justice, although by its terms, the Visiters and Governors of St. John's, are precluded from demanding any thing on the score of right. It is evident, notwithstanding, that if only one half of what was justly due to the College, by the sanctions of the highest principles of the law, had been received, this institution would not now be laboring under any deficiency of means, for an efficient co-operation with the friends of science to extend the bounds of human knowledge. The committee cannot, therefore, close this report, without expressing their belief that it would be highly in keeping with that elevated feeling which the state cherishes as well as co-incident with her policy and interest to bestow every aid that may be deemed reasonable upon this State Institution.

The committee feel that they violate no delicacy of sentiment, by publicly expressing their entire approbation of the manner in which this institution has been conducted, under the immediate controll of the President, who is an experienced instructor, a ripe scholar, an accomplished gen-

tleman and a zealous christian.
