The following was offered to be inserted as the sixth section.

"And be it enacted, That each member of said Band shall be answerable in his individual capacity, for all debts, contracts or liabilities of the said corporation."

The question was put,

"Will the Senate adopt said amendment?"

And it was determined in the negative.

The bill was then read through, and the question put,

"Shall the bill pass?"
