And the said superintendent is also hereby empowered to contract and agree with the owner or owners of any lands adjoining or near to any gate for the right and permission to construct or interpose any obstructions upon such lands as may be found necessary, to secure such gates against evasion; and said superintendent is hereby authorized to pay a reasonable sum for such privilege, or grant therefore the use of said road free of tolls, to the true owner or occupant of such lands.

Strike out the 5th Section, after the word "enacted," and insert, That from and after the passage of this act, the superintendent shall be entitled to receive and shall be paid an annual salary of six hundred dollars and shall also be allowed to charge & take in addition thereto, a commission of five per centum on all sums of money disbursed by him in lieu of the compensation, provided to be paid him by the act to which this is a supplement.

The bill was then read through and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Wootton from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to prevent swine and geese from going at large in the village of Piscataway, Prince George's county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Morris from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to provide for building a bridge over the Western Run in Baltimore county, at a place therein mentioned, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act relating to the grading of streets in the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, and

On motion of Mr. Mayer, amended as follows:

At the end of the 2nd section add,  
"And the expenses of said grading shall be paid as such ordinance shall direct."

The bill was then ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Pigman presented the petition of Edward A. Crummer, for a special act of insolvency.
