The bill entitled, an act to authorise Samuel Latimer, of Charles county, to bring into this state, a negro slave therein named, passed by the Senate on Saturday, was returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Pigman,

Leave was granted to the committee on insolvency to prepare and report a bill to be entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled, an act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at November session 1805, chapter 110.

On motion of Mr. Montgomery,

Leave was granted to Messrs. Montgomery, Mayer and Morris, to prepare and report a bill to be entitled, an act to incorporate the Baltimore and Peach Bottom Rail Road Company.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10

o'clock.

## WEDNESDAY, February 24th, 1836.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday.

The proceedings of yesterday were read.
