A bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Thomas N. Muir, Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs.

Hughlett, Wilson and Pigman.

A bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to authorize the trustees of the poor of Kent county, to purchase a farm or tract of land for the use of the poor, and to sell the present Alms House of said county, and for other purposes, passed at December session 1825, chapter 191,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs.

Osborn, Mayer and Groome.

A bill entitled, an act relating to certain banks in the city of Baltimore,

Which was read the first time and referred to the com-

mittee on finance.

A bill entitled, an act relating to the Alms House of Harford county,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs.

Montgomery, Wilson and Claude.

A bill entitled, an act to divorce Marinda Hyatt of Mont-

gomery county, from her husband Lloyd Hyatt, and

A bill entitled, an act to divorce Mildred B. Webster of Prince George's county, from her husband Zachariah Webster,

Which were severally read the first time and referred to

the committee on Divorces.

And returned the bill which originated in the Senate, entitled, an act to confirm an act passed at December session 1834, entitled, an act to repeal all that part of the constitution and form of government, as relates to the division of Washington county into eight seperate election districts, and for other purposes, endorsed "will not pass."

Also returned the resolutions which originated in the Se nate, authorizing the Governor to procure a portrait of General Otho Holland Williams, endorsed "dissented from."

Mr. Hughlett from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Thomas N. Muir, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second time.

Mr. Hughlett from the committee on revolutionary claims to which was referred the resolution in favor of Samuel Baldwin, reported that the committee had had said resolution under consideration and were of opinion it ought not to be assented to,
