By the House of Delegates,
April 2nd, 1836.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We beg leave respectfully to return to your honorable body the bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Atlantic rail road company, and ask of you a reconsideration of the same.

This bill though apparently of a local nature is of vital importance to a large portion of the Eastern Shore, and more so now, as the Eastern Shore rail road has failed to obtain the assent of the legislature for its passage. We therefore, earnestly ask of your honorable body to reconsider and pass the bill herein mentioned.
