

169. An act to authorise Samuel Jordan, former collector of taxes in the second collection district in Baltimore county, to complete his collections.

170. An act relating to Chatsworth street in the city of Baltimore.

171. An act for the relief of Benjamin G. Cole, former sheriff of St. Mary's county.

172. An act to authorise George A. Diggs to bring into this state a negro slave.

173. An act to continue in force the acts of assembly which would expire with the present session of the General Assembly.

174. An act to authorise and empower the levy court of Frederick county, in their discretion, to purchase the bridge over the river Monocacy, on the public road leading from Frederick city to Georgetown and Washington city.

175. An act to divorce Caleb Rhodes of the city of Baltimore, from his wife Fanny Rhodes.

176. An act to divorce Catharine Hyland of the city of Baltimore, from her husband Benjamin Hyland.

177. An act to incorporate the Phoenix Fire Insurance Company of Baltimore.

178. An act to divorce Thomas White of the city of Baltimore, from his wife Lucinda White.

179. An act to change the time of holding the November Term of Somerset county court.

180. An act to incorporate the Trustees of Havre de Grace Academy in Harford county.

181. An act supplemental to an act, for the re-valuation and re-assessment of the real property of Saint Mary's county.

182. An act for the devise of William Hill, late of Prince George's county, deceased.

183. An act to divorce Elizabeth Baker of the city of Annapolis, from her husband William Baker.

184. An act to provide indemnity to the sufferers by certain riots in the city of Baltimore.

185. An act to authorise the building of a bridge over Little Rumney Creek in Harford county.

186. A further supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a Turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks in this state, and for other purposes, passed at November session 1812, chapter 79.
