It was read the second and by special order the third time, assented to and returned to the house of delegates. On motion of Mr. Morris,

The resolution directing the armorer to deliver to each member of the Senate and House of Delegates, one of Hall's Patent Rifles, was re-considered:

The question was then put,

"Will the Senate assent to said resolution?"

It was determined in the negative, and the resolution

returned to the house of delegates.

The engrossed bills of the Senate, from No. 361 to No. 391 inclusive, were read assented to and sent to the

The clerk of the house of delegates returned the said engrossed bills of the Senate, endorsed "read and assented to."

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution relative to certain rifles,

Which was read the first time and referred to the com-

mittee on the militia.

Mr. Emory from the committee on the militia to which was referred the resolutisn relative to certain rifles, reported that the committee had had said resolution under consideration and were of opinion it ought to be assented to with the following amendments,

Which were read and assented to:

Strike out the word "armorer," in the 3d and 4th lines of the resolution, and insert the words "Adjutant General;" and after the word "thereupon" in the 10th line, insert the words "under the direction of the Adjutant

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the engrossed bills of the house of delegates from No. 342 to No. 361 inclusive, and from No. 394 to No. 397 inclu-

Which were read and assented to and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Forrest,

It was ordered, that the committee appointed to invite the presence of the Governor, for the purpose of signing. and sealing the laws, now signify to him that the Senate is in readiness to receive him.

The committee accordingly performed that duty.
