Whereas there hath been divers disputed wayes touching the fees due to the Secretaries for searching the Records both howsoever made in any future year or year of the first 10 haire four poundes of tobacco only and only notwithstanding Search made in former Books (vizt) without any Addition of the former years to be annexed to the Search of the last Search found

An Acte for the Repdale of the Acte for Customs

This Assembly considering the Passings made Betwene the Parties made at the Assembly held the second day of January 1646 at St Junyons Court wherein in Consideration of the Customs in the Acte granted to his High^{ness} the Right honorable the Lord Proprietary he doth undertake the whole charge of the Government both in warre and in peace and that other Acte confirmed by his High^{ness} Declaration bearing date the first day of August 1650 Entituled an Acte touching the levying of warre within this Province in the last Clause whiche Acte the whole charge of any warre arising within this Province is to be layd upon the Province by an equall Assessment upon the persons and Estates of the Inhabitants thereof any thing in that Acte or any other Acte to the contrary thereof notwithstanding And further taking into serious Consideration the Burthen of that Acte and the vast charge that hath been draune upon the Province by the late traitorous Revolt of Josias Bondart and his Complices And the greates Expence they must
