petition and acknowledged his hearty sorrow for his
faults concerning his mutinous and seditious expro-
= ions in the libell continued which he printed and was
published at London & Arundell

To the Right hono^{ble} the Lord High
Chancellor and to the hono^{ble}
Philip Balwe Esq^r Chancell^r
and to the honored Councell

The humble petition of Robert Burle
Sheweth

That whereas yo^r pet^r is adjudged by yo^r hono^r
made by the Burgesse to have committed a great
transgression, and that of a high nature which
he hath committed inconsiderately through infirmity
and weakness for which he doth hold himselfe to
be heartily sorry and humbly prayeth yo^r hono^r
to pardon and pass by his great offences and
countenancing himselfe to be the first offender since
his M^o Arriall humbly prayeth for forgiveness
which may be for the Honor of his M^o and
shall engage yo^r pet^r to better fidelity & loyalty
and feythfull obedience and shall never engage
the petitioner to pray for yo^r hono^r prosperity

Ordered that the said Burle doe forthwith
goe to the lower house and aske pardon for his
faults and that the Clerk of the lower house be
desired to see his submission recorded in the
journal
