

Then & aunc^{es} Pappimun I asked hunt and Hunt
and sayd they haue a desire and hope to live at
Choptico

Whereupon the Lieutenant Generall ordered that
this should be asked them why they feared they
should be putt off. Answered that Doctor Barber
and the Sonne of M^r Thomas Boston would haue it
It was then asked the Indians whether they were
willing to lett them haue it or not

To which Pappimun answered it was his desire
but the rest of the Indians would not consent to it
Papaohunt desired that they might live together
having not other place to goe to.

Ordered that the Indians doe deliuer all writings
written from and the Sonne of Thomas Boston
back againe, and that they be permitted to live at
Choptico without disturbance they fencing in their
grounde from Cattle and horses, and that all papers
and contracts touching his Land be voyd.

The Lower house sent to desire to knowe whether
Robert Barber might not be admitted to sitt with
them againe.

The Lieutenant Generall left it to their discrecion

The Upper house adjourned till
nine of the clock in the morn.

Saturday 5th April

I went all as before.

The house sent M^r Lloyd to the lower house to know
whether they had any business prepared for this
house, Answer being returned that they haue not
drawne up any bill as yett they having some other
business to consider on

Ordered
That the house be adjourned till Monday
nine of the clock in the morn.
