

The Chancellors opinion that it might not be passed  
without Amendment.

The Courtiers opinion that it should be passed without  
Amendment.

The House rose upon the bringing of the bill for  
quitting possession from the lower house again  
and voted that it pass according to the Amendment  
of the last Clause, and referred it till the  
morning.

The House adjourned till tomorrow  
morning 9 of the Clock.

Sept. 26<sup>th</sup>

Present as before.

Then was read the bill for quitting possession  
which the Secretary carried to the lower house.

Then came an Act from the lower house for  
appraisement of goods which was read in the  
house.

Came an Act for inquiry into measures to be  
taken.

And the House adjourned till  
9 of the Clock in the morning.

Monday Sept. 27<sup>th</sup>

Present as before except M. Bateman.

Came a Messenger from the lower house with  
the bill for quitting possession.

Resolved that the Chancellor and Secretary go  
to the lower house with the bill for quitting  
possession and explaining the reasons of the Amendment  
of this house so that Act and after some time  
of consideration.

Then came a Messenger from the lower house  
a question being then moved, whether any  
person have formerly surveyed land or obtained  
Grant thereof from the Lord Proprietor or some other  
person some afterwards by Curtesy, not knowing  
the former bounds of the land adjacent or run  
or line within the limits of the land formerly.
