The Answer of Mr. Thankes to severall Interrogatories put to
him by the upper house.

This Depon^t saith that he with y^e Maryland forces being at the
gate of the Susquehannough on y^e Sabbath day he was sent upto the
gate to desir one of the great men by Name Parigera to come and
s^tealke with Major Truman, and y^e said Parigera being dead this
Deponent desired some other great man to come and speake with y^e de
Major - Upon which message of his, there came out 3 or 4 of them,
and that Deponent was commanded by the S^r. Major to tell them
of y^e great injuries that had been done to y^e County and y^e he came to
know who they were y^e had done them, and the great men Replyed
it was the Senecas, and this deponent saith that there being other Indians
present from other towns, the Major desired some of their young men
to assist as pilotes as well as y^e Neighbouring Indians had done to joyne
in y^e perfide w^t the Senecas. And the said Indians Replyed that
the Seneca's had been gone 4 days and y^e by y^e time they might be at y^e
head of Patapsco River, to which Major Truman Retorne^d that he
had good horse^s and they were good footmen and might soon overtake
them and the Indians Replyed they would, And y^e Deponent further saith
that in y^e morning following the Susquehannough great men being
at the place of meeting before y^e Marylanders and Virginians y^e great
men were taxed againe by the Virginians more highly of y^e injuries
